

Getting more out of your Google searching: 10 weird tactics you won't believe Dan Russell

While everyone uses Google for their everyday searching, not everyone knows the depth and breadth of what Google searching can uncover. Dan Russell will share with us a set of capabilities we should know, and the skills we need to use them effectively. He will touch on the legal content of Google Scholar (and when you should use it in your research), as well as the content available through Google Books, Google News, and the News Archives. He'll also cover some of the more advanced operators that let you zoom in on exactly what you're searching for - be it in regular web content, or in different kinds of collections (such as social media content). Finally, he'll wrap up with a few very advanced capabilities, such as the way to find and analyze data sets with Google tools.

Daniel Russell is a research scientist at Google where has been working in the area of search quality, with a focus on understanding what makes Google users happy, skilled and competent in their use of web search. He is sometimes called a search anthropologist because of his focus on understanding how people use the tools of technology to amplify their intelligence. But his research methods draw equally on ethnography and field work, lab studies, classical usability analysis, eye tracking experiments and large-scale logs analysis.
